COURSE OBJECTIVE	Electronic Field Production II introduces students to the terminology, applications, and rules of three prominent post-production stages: Editing, Sound, Color. They will learn and apply aesthetic choices and technological workflow for both picture AND sound editing in relation to narrative and documentary filmmaking. This course will include hands-on editing projects, sound capture to sound mix, and color correction/grading.
STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES	By the end of the semester, the student should be able to: 1) Understand the different post-production workflows for Narrative and Documentary 2) Use non linear editing software to organize and sequence images efficiently 3) Identify and understand the editing techniques that make up styles and genres 4) Enhance cinematic composition techniques through editing 5) Comprehension of sound editing & sound mixing techniques 6) Use adobe apps to color correct sound edit, sound design and sound mix 7) Offer and respond to constructive feedback pertaining to their own work, and others

PUBLISHING POLICIES	Much of the footage we'll use in this class is licensed for educational purposes. Students are not permitted to post their projects online. Doing such can result in a student having a grade point deduction and/or receiving an incomplete or failing grade in the class.

EVALUATIONS

Narrative Projects: Students access footage from previously shot short films (4-5 min), and con-struct sequences/scenes into a final short project. Each will be a different genre.

Documentary Projects: Students access footage from previously shot short docs (4-5 min), and construct sequences/scenes into a final doc project. Each will be a different documentary type.

Sound Edit/Design/Mix Project: Students take a finished short film (4-5 min) with all sound, other than story world recorded sound, stripped away. Starting from scratch they will build out all aspects of the soundscape, onto completion of mastering/mixing and then export.

Coloring Exercises: Students apply principles of color theory in color correcting and grading.

Final Project: Students will take the footage for a short film and picture edit, sound edit/design/mix, and color correct/grade it. Short film must be 6 to 7 minutes long when exported.
